

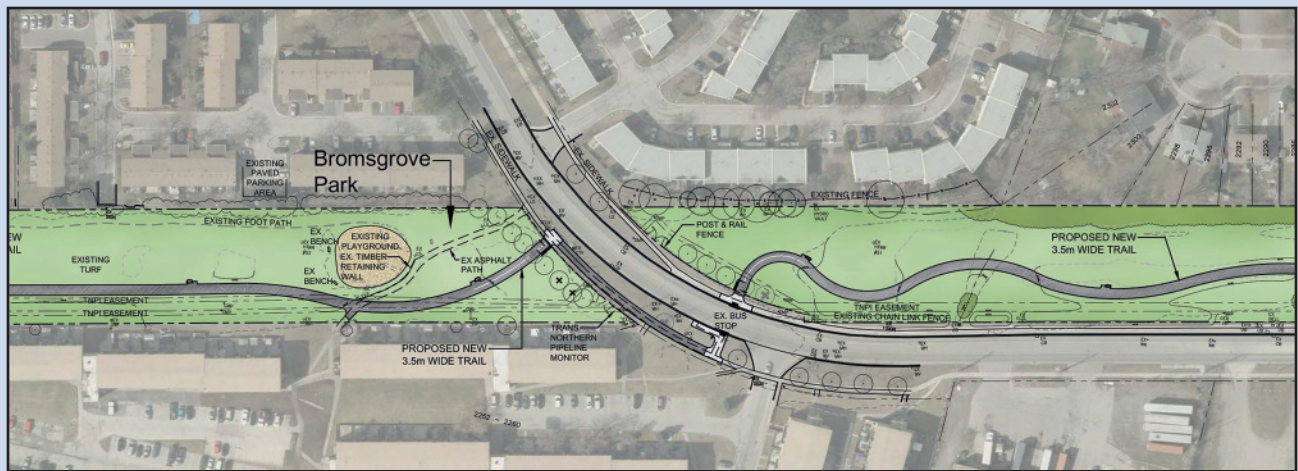

## Multi-Use Hydro Trail

On March 28, 2017, at Lorne Park Secondary School, Clarkson residents heard details and plans regarding the proposed \$3 million multi-use trail that will be available for public use along the Royal Windsor Hydro One Corridor.

The trail will be 3.5 metres wide and largely made of asphalt with concrete in places. The current hydro poles will stay as they are and the trail will zigzag between them.

There will be off-set staggered gates at street crossings to prevent people from crossing streets at high speeds.

There will not be any lighting installed along the trail and it will not be maintained in the winter. Informal resting areas made of large stones will be spread out along the trail, but there will be no picnic tables or benches.

Construction of the trail is scheduled to begin this fall completing sometime after December 2018.

## 1516 and 1526 Southdown Road

On January 16, 2017 the Planning and Development Committee of the City of Mississauga approved the rezoning and official plan amendment application to construct a two-storey office building.

## 2210 and 2230 Bromsgrove Road

The City of Mississauga is processing applications to redevelop 2210 and 2230 Bromsgrove Road with 104 back-to-back townhouses on a private condominium road.

The recommendation report for this application is targeted for the June 26, 2017 Planning and Development Committee Meeting if the applicant satisfies all outstanding comments.

## 2200 Bromsgrove Road

The City of Mississauga has received new Official Plan Amendment and Rezoning applications for the property at 2200 Bromsgrove Road. The plan is to build 84 back-to-back three-storey stacked townhouses. This property is immediately east of the 104 townhouse development proposed by a different applicant and owner.

A community meeting was held by Councillor Karen Ras on Thursday, March 23, 2017. Comments have been issued to the applicant and the applicant is in the process of revising their proposal to address these comments. As the Planning and Development Committee does not meet in July and August, it will likely not be until the fall before this proposal comes before that committee.

## Willow Glen Public School demolition

The demolition of Willow Glen Public School occurred in November. The closing of this agreement has been delayed until the end of May when the final sodding and grading will be completed.

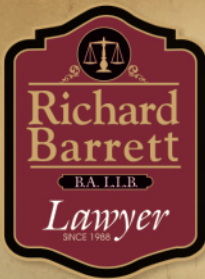
A public information session will be held in September by Councillor Karen Ras to seek comments from the community regarding city plans for park development on site.

## Hillside Park reconstruction

The playground at Hillside Park, beside Hillside Public School, has been demolished. Through funding from Canada 150, the playground is being upgraded. Construction will start in the next few weeks and will likely include fitness equipment.

# Region of Peel's next stages of watermain replacement

Residents should expect traffic disruptions, lane closures and reduced street parking

The Region of Peel is replacing watermain, water services and fire hydrants throughout Ward 2. The current infrastructure is outdated and requires frequent repairs and some areas have experienced low water pressure.

The first phase of construction (Assignment A) started in late November 2016, and will continue through early fall 2017. The contractor began work on Benedet Drive, Birch and Poplar Crescents, and Vey Road—to be completed in the next couple of weeks when they will start the restoration of paving, curbs and sod. They will then be moving south to start work on Tredmore Drive, Harman and Selord Courts, and Playford Road. Notices to residents from the Region of Peel will be sent shortly.

As part of this construction, the Region will be adjusting pressure zones in the area bounded by Truscott, Tredmore and Lewisham Drives, and Bromsgrove Road. Residents will receive a water pressure increase notice with information prior to any planned changes.

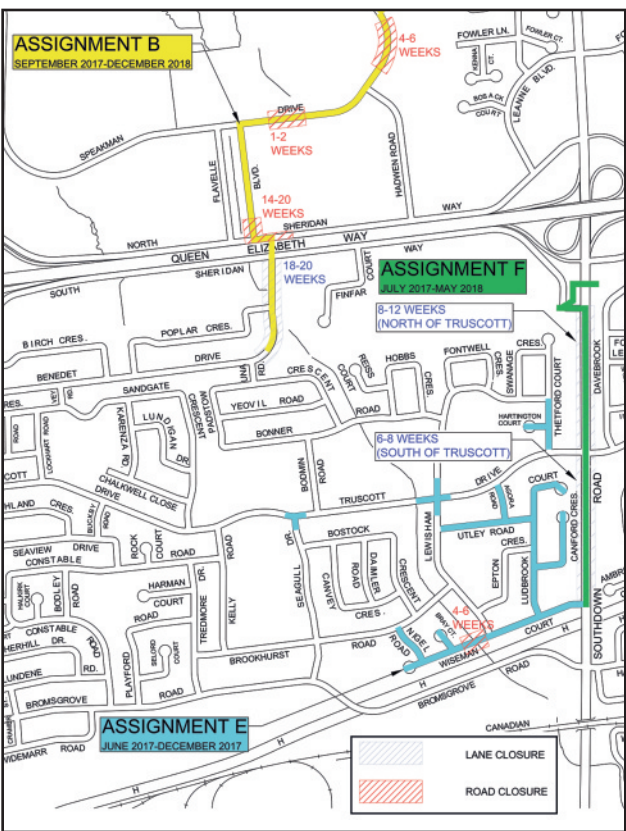
They are working to minimize the impact of construction; residents should expect traffic disruptions, lane closures and reduced on-street parking. Once the work has been completed all streets will be paved and any disturbed areas will be restored.

The Region is also anticipating starting construction on other streets within Ward 2. Some of these projects are dependent on infrastructure money that has been applied for under the Clean Water and Wastewater Fund (CWWF). Please see the map (on the right). Upcoming planned infrastructure projects are as follows:

Assignment B is in the industrial park northwest of Erin Mills Parkway and the Queen Elizabeth Way. This work will include a tunnelled crossing of the QEW. The anticipated construction timeline is to begin in late 2017 and terminate at the end of 2018. This will cause some long term road closures.

Assignment C will be located along the multi-use trail in Kodgadywin Park between Benedet Drive and Southdown Road. The construction will commence in 2018.

Assignment E includes the following residential streets: Wiseman, Ludbrook, Bray, Thetford and Hartington Courts; Nigel, Utley and Agora Roads; and Canford Crescent. It will also include a pressure zone boundary adjustment and will result in pressure increases for area residents. This project is dependent on CWWF funding but is anticipated to start summer 2017 or once funding is received.



Assignment F includes watermain construction along Southdown Road from South Sheridan Way to Wiseman Court. It is also dependent on CWWF funding and is also planned to start summer 2017 or once funding is received.

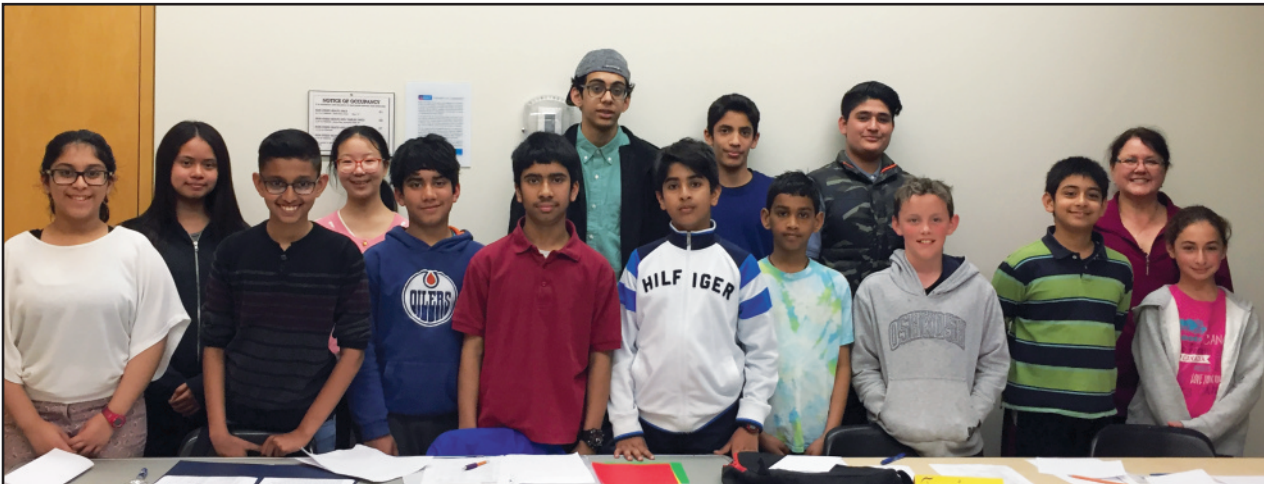
